Guitar Music Theory - Major, minor, Diminished, Augmented Triads

Triad chords exist in four different chord qualities, which are major, minor, augmented, and diminished. Each chord quality name is the name of the entire chord as a whole, not its individual notes (which will be covered later). Triad chord qualities using the 1st, 3rd and 5th scale notes

Music Intervals : Major Perfect Augmented & Diminished

To change a Major triad into a Diminished triad, lower the middle note (the third) and the top note (the fifth) a half step each. The intervals between the notes are both minor 3rds. (Ex: F#, A, D) is the first inversion triad of (Ex: D, F#, A) is the root position triad.

Major and chords are essentially the meat of songs serving as primary and secondary harmony. Diminished and augmented chords serve as transition chords in music. For example, they'll often serve as passing chords to add interest in a song. This is due to the feeling of tension that they create. Before I go any farther, I just want to review the structure of Major and minor chords. All chords are constructed of intervals.

What Are Diminished and Augmented Triads?

Because they don't contain a perfect fifth, augmented and diminished chords have an unsettled feeling and are normally used sparingly. An augmented chord is built from two major thirds, which adds up to an augmented fifth. A diminished chord is built from two minor thirds, which add up to a diminished fifth.

The inversion of a major interval is a minor interval, and vice versa; the inversion of a perfect interval is also perfect; the inversion of an augmented interval is a diminished interval, and vice versa; the inversion of a doubly augmented interval is a doubly diminished interval, and vice versa. So basically, you can take a major triad and raise the 5th note by a half step to get the augmented version (since a major triad is a major third on the bottom and a minor third on the top). The augmented triad has lots of uses and can resolve in many ways. By 'resolve', I mean it naturally has the tendency to lead into another chord. We'll get into that later. Just familiarize yourself with how the augmented triad is constructed in comparison to the major and minor triads. Diminished ...

A diminished fifth and an augmented fourth are both six half-steps, or three whole tones, so another term for this interval is a tritone. This unique interval, which cannot be spelled as a major, minor, or perfect interval, is considered unusually dissonant and unstable (tending to want to resolve to another interval) in Western Music.

If an interval is a half-step larger than a perfect or a major interval, it is called augmented. An interval that is a half-step smaller than a perfect or a minor interval is called diminished.

In a triad, the root note is at the bottom with the third and fifth stacked above. Diminished and augmented chords are two types of triads. Augmented triads have an unusual, mysterious sound, while diminished chords have an unsettling, dissonant sound. The other two types of triads are major and minor.

Constructing Major, Minor, Augmented and Diminished Triads ...

Only the intervals of a second, third, sixth, and seventh (and the compound intervals based on them) may be major or minor (or, rarely, diminished or augmented). Unisons, fourths, fifths, and octaves and their compound interval must be perfect (or, rarely, diminished or augmented).
